Theme

As with most medical specialties, the WHO definition of palliative care emphasizes the identification and treatment of health problems and suffering in the physical, psychosocial and spiritual domains. However, recent research shows that patients' quality of life improves more significantly and sustainably if it also builds on patients' and relatives' identified resources. This scientific symposium highlights research on the diverse array of resources in palliative care, as a necessary complementary perspective to the classical deficit-oriented approach.

Resources can be classified into four levels: internal (e.g. spirituality, gratitude), external (e.g. family, friends, finances), community (e.g. caring communities, hospice volunteers), and societal (e.g. health care policies, palliative care availability). In order to detect and foster these resources, it is necessary to look in depth at interactions between patients, their loved ones, and health professionals, as well as the efforts undertaken at the community and societal levels. A resource-based approach also underlines the importance of interprofessionality in palliative care and could represent a paradigm worthy of being valued more widely in healthcare.

What would a consistent implementation of resource-oriented palliative care look like? Esteemed international experts from diverse disciplines will address this question during the symposium.

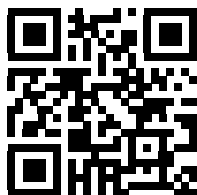
