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Advanced Practice Nurse (APN)






- Have a Master or PhD

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Behavioural risk counselling



Men who have sex with men (MSM) living with HIV:

- 4.8% prevalence
- 10-15/100 person years show an HCV reinfection after successful treatment
- Engagement in high-risk sexual behavior

Elimination of HCV requires treatment and behavioral change

- Swiss HCVree Trial: Multi-center, open-label trial in 3 phases
- Implementation of an eHealth-assisted behavioural intervention

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
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Swiss HCVree Trial - Results



 A strong decline in HCV prevalence (84%) HCV incidence (57%)



 All participants responded to the intervention with reflection of behavior and values, but indicating different motivation to initiate risk reduction behavior.

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Implications for clinical practice



- Clinicians well-positioned to initiate and stimulate risk-related discussion
- Turning the discussion to a teachable moment by addressing and planning concrete behavioral changes
- · Patient-centered communication styles

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Self-management in liver care



- The ability to manage symptoms, treatments, lifestyle changes, and psychosocial, cultural, and spiritual consequences of health conditions
- Support is associated with improved knowledge, self-efficacy and better quality of life

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Implications for clinical practice



- Patients and caregivers act as team
 - ✓ Inclusion of caregivers
 - ✓ Individualized support for both
- · Dealing with emotions are often neglected, stigma
 - ✓ Asking, acknowledgement, empowerment
- Experience of overt hepatic encephalopathy was shocking but part of learning process
 - ✓ Reprocessing of an episode prevents additional burden



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- We developed the content of a nurse-led counselling service.
- We defined processes and structures to provide continuity of care and self-management support.
- The APNs provide face-to-face consultations, using developed written and visual material.
- Ward nurses practice with patients and repeat learnings.

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It remains a team work



Email from a nurse after APN counselling:

"Mr B. was already on the scales at 6.30am and he had already prepared his lactulose himself but waited with taking until he could discuss with me.

I am thrilled!"
